FOREWORD

This report is my final report as Chair, and so I want to take this opportunity to share our journey so far, our

ambitions for the future, and to celebrate our achievements.

It has been a great privilege and honour to have instigated the development of the MWC with like-minded visionaries, and then to have led the MWC as Director and Chair for a decade. When we began, we were concerned about the lack of representation of Muslim women in the mainstream, the social injustices experienced by Muslim women in the name of religion, and the lack of Muslim women's voices in the public arena. Over the course of the last 10 years, we have made significant contributions in each of these important areas.

MWC is unique in that its reach is both local and international. We deliver services to the most marginalised members of our communities; the homeless, the excluded and disadvantaged. Our initiatives have addressed community issues ranging from mental health, child sexual exploitation and food poverty.

At the other end of the spectrum, we provide thought leadership, influencing change locally, nationally and internationally. Some examples of our ability to influence and make a difference include the discourse on women's access to, presence in, and involvement in Mosques. When MWC announced the desire to create a Women Led Mosque, it was reported globally. MWC was the catalyst; it threw the pebble in the pond and the ripple effects continue to be felt nationally and internationally. Due to this, Muslim Council of Britain has since undertaken a consultation regarding women and mosques, and instigated leadership programmes for women wanting to join mosque management boards. Meanwhile, MWC continues with its vision to establish a Women Led Mosque.

Looking ahead, our priorities are set in a context of political turbulence and uncertainty. With this in mind, the key areas of work for MWC will include research into the social and economic impact of policy changes on the well-being of our communities, and our goal of a Women Led Building that is holistic in its approach and inclusive of everyone.

I would like to conclude by thanking the amazing MWC team, management committee members past and present, volunteers, supporters and well-wishers. With their unfaltering support, we have surpassed anything we could have imagined ten years ago.

I would especially like to mention a few individuals who have been on the journey throughout; Bana Gora, CEO: our 'core of steel', who has steered MWC through rocky times; Fatima Ayub, our 'Queen of engagement and contacts'; Nuzhat Ali, our 'Sage and knowledge bank' for her advocacy for women's scholarship; and Saadia Mushtaq, our 'Oasis' - her smiling, calm and reassuring presence has been a soothing balm for every eventuality we faced.

As outgoing Chair, I would like to welcome MWC's incoming Chair, Dr Shuruq Naquib, who has been both a committee member and a great supporter and enthusiast for the work of MWC. For any organisation to flourish, it is important that the leadership is relevant and refreshed. Shuruq is well known nationally and internationally for her research and career in academia.

Over the past decade, MWC has established a strong reputation as being professional, pertinent and pioneering. This was made possible by the MWC team's unwavering commitment and passion.


Bana Gora Chief Executive



Shared Heritage of Daughters of Eve was a year-long interfaith project on head coverings. Head coverings are perceived as solely belonging to the Islamic faith, however, this is far from the reality as the majority of faiths promote female head coverings. MWC used this book as a tool to challenge this perception and as a celebration of the shared heritage of head coverings. MWC led the project and involved women from Christian, Judaic and Muslim faiths. These women met frequently over the course of 12 months to share their experiences, stories and through journeys their respective faiths and how head coverings have played a part in their lives.





Women's Building

One of the largest ventures Muslim Women's Council is currently undertaking is "the Women's Building" project. The vision for the project is to create a safe space in Bradford, which provides the necessary tools and resources to create better lives for Muslim women, their families and their communities.

By offering direct access to personal scholarship and leadership opportunities in this building, MWC aims to uplift and empower Muslim women and girls. The building will be women led and governed; housing four distinct areas of service:



MWC Community Events

One of the key goals of the Muslim Women's council is to host events that increase skills and knowledge which will benefit the wider community.

These events discuss contemporary issues affecting the Muslim community including; homosexuality, organ donation, breast cancer, mental health and Islamophobia/hate crimes. These events have opened up much needed dialogue in the local Muslim community and received commendation from attendees.





The Curry Circle

In response to the national food poverty crisis affecting an increasing number of people in the UK, Muslim Women's Council launched the Curry Circle initiative in 2013 aimed to alleviate local hunger crisis. The Curry Circle provides a free hot curry, hot drinks, and a clean warm environment on a weekly basis for homeless/destitute people. Since its launch, the Curry Circle has provided over 40,000 meals to an average of 100 weekly service users. The backbone of this service is the hundreds of volunteers who through their commitment and dedication ensure the Curry Circle is a success. Along with the volunteers, the weekly service has been sustained through many sponsors including local businesses, individuals and community fundraisers.

Aunties Network ROM Campaign Think Tank Pilot Free Legal Advice

Aunties Network

One of the more recent projects established by MWC in February 2019 is The Aunties Network. The network is a group of women who are provided with the training and skills needed to become mentors and make real differences in our communities.

1) We train mentors on how to identify signs of Child Sexual Exploitation

2) The mentors will then use their own informal networks to raise awareness within the homes of Muslim families

3) The mentors will capture and log information, which will be shared with the appropriate agencies when necessary.



The network visits public organisations (schools, community centres etc) to offer support, insight and knowledge and utilises informal networks to raise awareness within Muslim homes, informing and enabling mothers and daughters to benefit from greater awareness of signs, dangers and to empower them with a voice that can be heard.



Free Legal Advice

Over the years Muslim Womens' Council have constantly received calls/emails from women in desperate need of legal advice but unable to afford it. To help solve this issue MWC partnered with Ameet Patel from Stachiw Bashir Green to provide a free legal advice drop-in for women. This weekly drop is confidential and encompasses many areas:

Register Our Marriage (ROM) Campaign

Following our growing national profile we were invited and contracted by ROM to partner on designing and developing their two phase campaign: helping Muslim communities better understand the importance of registering their marriage and understanding the legal protections available. MWC were contracted by MHCLG to design and develop a campaign approach, develop ROM as a standalone organisation, development plan, research framework, recruit leads and steering groups in 3 Cities and deliver campaign training to leads and steering groups.








Think Tank Pilot

Muslim Women's Council launched the "Think Tank Pilot Project" in July 2019. This new and innovative project's aim is to deliver a year-long programme that includes leadership training to Muslim women on issues such as domestic violence, hate crime, Islamophobia, and polygamy-with the ultimate goal of establishing a think-tank and empowering participants to become community influencres and produce new relevant research. The aim is to build to trust between communities and research institutes. This exciting unique project will provide evidence, recommendations and solutions to guide government, donor institutions and private sector on how to create conditions that allow Muslim women to thrive.





The Big Iftar

In June 2017, hundreds of Bradfordians from all walks of life gathered together to share a meal at "Iftar in the Park". This event was a joint initiative with the Jo Cox Foundation celebrating the legacy of Jo Cox who was murdered June 2016, whilst simultaneously marking the holy month of Ramadan.

With over 500 attendees, the atmosphere at the event was electric and full of warmth. People came together and listened to the recitation of devotional prayers, speakers fondly reminisced about Bradford and finished with sharing a meal together as the sun set over Bradford.

The Muslim Women's Council worked with a range of local partners including Bradford Council, Martin House Hospice, Bradford Council for Mosques, Bradford Reform Synagogue, Touchstone Bradford, Wellsprings Together Bradford, Carlisle Business Centre, Noor UI Islam Mosque, Saveco Cash & Carry. The food was generously donated by MyLahore, Akbar's Restaurant, and Aziz Catering to ensure the event was a success.

As part of our consultation phase we consulted with both men and women across the UK gaining an insight into what the most pertinent issues were that the Muslim community were facing. Both individual interviews and focus groups took place during this initial phase. Our Stories Our Lives presents the stories of 20 women from Bradford between the ages of 14 and 80, from their own points of view. The book belongs to a long tradition of oral history where practical knowledge is passed from generation. to generation. It offers an intricate mosaic of the experiences, views and hopes of these women and gives voice to an important and often marginalised group.

In 2010, open recruitment events were organised across the Bradford District to recruit the MWC Steering group, Independent observers and facilitators were recruited to assist in the selection process. 10 women were selected to start the movement. We toured with a play titled The Hijab which opened up stimulating debates.

The inaugural Daughters of Eve Conference was held in partnership with Islamic Society of Britain in May 2011, entitled 'Muslim Women: Critically Thinking the Past, Present & Future'. A total of 300 women participated in the first national residential conference organised by Muslim women in Bradford.

The three-day Conference programme featured inspiring talks, informative exhibitions, challenging discussions, dynamic workshops, a theatrical production by Arakan Creative and a performance by the female hip hop duo Poetic Pilgrimage. Saturday's session culminated in a beautiful musical performance by Lebanese operatic soprano & composer Hiba Al-Kawas.



Hundreds of Bradfordians of all faiths and none flocked to Bradford City Park on 18th June 2017, to share a meal at 'Iftar in the Park', a joint initiative with the Jo Cox Foundation celebrating the legacy of Jo Cox, and also marking the month of Ramadan when Muslims fast, with the Big Iftar.

The event was hosted in partnership wth Bradford Council, MyLahore, Martin House Hospice, Bradford Council for Mosques, Bradford Reform Synagogue, Touchstone Bradford, Wellsprings Together Bradford and Carlisle Business Centre. The Daughters of Eve Conference 2017 was held in the heart of Bradford at the Mercure Bankfield Hotel over a three day period: 6th, 7th and 8th October. The first day of the conference was opened up to men in order to get a variety of opinions on a range of topics. The day consisted of a series of sessions with expert opinions on themes such as Muslim responses to extremism and the Legitimisation of Islamophobia in the Mainstream. The evening session explored why feminine readings of the Quran are important for modern society, delivered by leading feminist scholar Dr. Riffat Hassan. The second day consisted of a variety of panel discussions on topics such as Connecting Divided Worlds, Shared Heritage: Reimagining Our World and a post play panel discussion. This was followed by an evening of shopping and entertainment by world renowned singer Shabnam Khan.

Sunday's session was an intensive teach in with Dr. Riffat Hassan and Dr. Shuruq Naguib on the following themes: Muslim Womer, a paradigm shift and Muslim Women; Sacred Texts & Religious Authority.


